THE DIRECTOR'S THOUGHTS

I came across the following article that I believe touches the heart of what the church's focus should be.

"Information Overload" is a trendy catch phrase, but it accurately describes the condition of modern life. There are over 30,000 books published each year, more than any person could read. Even the Sunday Newspaper can't be read in a single day. There are television, radio, and internet outlets that clamor to feed us information with so many voices demanding the average person's attention. How can the church communicate the message of the Gospel?

The human mind is designed to accept that of which it has knowledge or with which it already has experience. Most other things get filtered out. The church must learn to position its message so that it will be received for consideration. Positioning doesn't seek to manipulate the message. Instead, it attempts to evoke some change in the mind of the hearer.

Avis Car Rental, for example, is number two in the rental business. Who wants to hear about number two? Its slogan, though, is catchy and easy to remember – "We Try Harder." By positioning its message effectively, Avis occupies a place in the minds of people.

What can the church do to implant its clear message in cluttered minds? Some suggestions would be **FIRST**, one thing it can do is to be there first. The Wright brothers were the first to build a successful airplane. Who was the second? People usually fail to remember those who came in second with a new idea. The principle also applies to the delivery of a revolutionary message of hope. **SECOND**, the church should also discover the true wants, needs, and dreams of the people to whom it is communicating. Social and economic improvements are nice, but they will never fully satisfy. People are groping for something to fill the emptiness that only God can fill. They are looking for the comfort that is found only in Christ. And Christ is the primary message of a New Testament Church.

As a church we need to keep the message of Christ clear and primary in all we do. Let others see Jesus in You. That is **OUR MINISTRY**. God bless.
